INCREASING CHAPMAN'S VISIBILITY REGIONALLY AND ABROAD

Dean Patrick Fuery, Dr. Ann Gordon, Dr. Kelli Fuery and Natalie Lawler have been awarded a grant from the European Union (EU) to develop Creative and Cultural Industries (CCI) at Chapman University. The project will include hosting artists/writers and scholars in residence



from the EU, running a major international conference that will feature key academics, strategists, policy makers and practitioners from

Europe and the US, and the launch of an incubator that will provide a platform for faculty, students and the local community to build ongoing projects with Europe. The EU has played the major role in the development of CCI as a key strategy for social, economic, and cross-cultural relations. It is a global leader in exploring CCI as a core part of economic growth, social wellbeing, and cultural development. By recognizing and raising the profile of the innovative and original work of the EU a key objective of this project is to establish a sustainable exchange between the EU and US.

The project has three objectives; establish sustainable connections between the EU and US, articulate the EU as a key global agency of CCI analysis and development demonstrating the impact a range of projects have



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had in targeted areas such as urban regeneration, social inclusion and diversity, and focus on issues of the visual. In addition, the project will network Chapman with important groups in southern California such as the Getty Museum, Bowers Museum, LACMA, Octane, OC Business Council, MOLAA, LA Tourism Board, and San Francisco Museum of Modern Art. This will increase both our regional and international profile. The project will span two years.

NEH COLLABORATIVE GRANT DECEMBER 9, 2015

The NEH Collaborative Research Grants support interpretive humanities research undertaken by two or more collaborating scholars, for full-time or part-time activities for periods of one to three years. Support is available for various combinations of scholars, consultants and research assistants; project-related travel; field work; applications of information technology; and technical support and services.



NEH PUBLIC SCHOLAR PROGRAM FEBRUARY 2, 2015

The Public Scholar program supports well-researched books in the humanities intended to reach a broad readership. It aims to encourage scholarship that will be of broad interest and have lasting impact. Such scholarship might present a narrative history, tell the stories of important individuals, analyze significant texts, provide a synthesis of ideas, revive interest in a neglected subject, or examine the latest thinking on a topic.

NEA ART WORKS FEBRUARY 19, 2015

The NEA funds projects only which may consist of one or more specific events or

activities and do not have to be new. The Art Works program supports the creation of art that meets the



highest standards of excellence, public engagement with diverse and excellent art, lifelong learning in the arts, and the strengthening of communities through the arts. Matching grants generally range from \$10,000 to \$100,000.

FUNDING IN ACTION: DR. HAN PARTNERS WITH MISSOURI STATE PROFESSOR

Political Science Professor, Lori Cox Han has partnered with Brian Calfano, Associate Professor of Political Science

Missouri State on her project titled, The ESPN Effect on Politics. Dr. Cox Han presented her initial research in a paper at the



Western Political Science Association's annual meeting in April 2015. Dr. Han currently has a journal article underway, but her long term prospects include additional articles, a book manuscript and a NSF grant. Over this past summer, Dr. Han was awarded funds through Wilkinson College's internal funding program to support the continuation of her survey

research through a general population panel provided by Qualtrics. The initial results suggest that framing politics as a game/sporting match increase political efficacy. Dr. Han's Future work will consider the role of framing political news coverage as a game/sporting match and connections to questions such as voter knowledge and turnout. Wilkinson is looking forward to seeing what future success is headed her way.
